

June Service Project gets delivered in July!

Soroptimist International of Conejo Valley (SI of Conejo Valley) was recently contacted by Frank Bellinghiere, major volunteer for several organizations over the years, who has helped to raise awareness and funds for many. He wanted to alert us about a critical need in the Conejo Valley community to help feed the homeless population.

On behalf of Lutheran Social Services Southern California (LSSSC), he was reaching out to the various non-profit service clubs & organizations in the Conejo Valley, hoping they would be able to provide any level of financial assistance during this pandemic crisis, so that LSSSC could continue to provide food to the homeless and those in need.


LSSSC-Ventura County serves the homeless through their Thousand Oaks location at the Community Conscience Human Services Center. They are currently experiencing a huge demand for meals. It takes approximately \$25 per day to provide 3 meals to a person.

SI of Conejo Valley *answered the call* and decided to make our June Service Project a cash donation to LSSSC for their Food and Meal Program that serves the Conejo Valley community. With the generous donations from our individual members along with a \$150 club donation, we were able to contribute a total donation of \$650 to LSSSC. Several members were in attendance (using proper social distancing) to present the check to Nathan Hickling, Volunteer Coordinator & Case Manager, and Dichele Harris, Area Director, on July 8th.





Our Live Your Dream Banquet was canceled. We moved forward with giving cash grants to our three recipients this year: Amber Fairclough, Rachel Lopez and Heather Lowe.





Our 2020 "Live Your Dream Award" recipient, Amber Fairclough, grew up in a single parent home which consisted of herself, her three sisters and her mother – all girls. Amber's mother was unable to complete college with financial challenges of finding herself alone with four daughters. As a family, they had to overcome many difficulties and financial obstacles many of which were insurmountable. However, these obstacles taught Amber to persevere, to work hard and never, never give up. Amber's mother homeschooled her and her sisters and it was during that time where Amber's love for education and learning began. As a child she began to dream…and she dreamt of being a teacher. Amber would line up her dolls, barbies, stuffed

animals and even younger sisters in a classroom setting and teach all sorts of things. This carried on into the jobs and roles she would apply for that allowed her to use her love for teaching in the workplace.

In her teen years, Amber began to work full time and for an extended time, put her education on the back burner in order to help her family financially. Working full time for the next 10 years, Amber couldn't commit to pursuing her education. She began to also help provide for her sister and nieces after their father left. Finally, in her late 20's she made the firm decision to go to college. Though no one in her family was able to complete their college education, Amber is devoted to breaking that mold and doing so!

Pursing her degree in Early Childhood Education, Amber has a desire to see the educational system embrace more artistic, active and sensory, hands on learning in every age and subject. She is also considering a double major in business.

Despite the obstacles of herself being a single mother with a young daughter, Amber is focused on achieving her educational goals as well as personal. She hopes to instill and exemplify to her daughter that through hard work and perseverance, no age, gender, financial status or obstacle can hinder one from moving forward in pursuit of their dreams. Amber also hopes to continue and complete her education while her daughter is young to be able to provide the same values but with more opportunities that education will allow an open door to achieve.



Runner-Up Rachel Lopez a single mother of 2 children with a special situation.

"I have a Deaf daughter and a hearing son. Since my daughter is profoundly Deaf, she doesn't verbally speak, and when she was young, I struggled with learning American Sign Language.

I made a choice to return to school and major in Deaf Studies at California State University Northridge. Since then, I fell in love with Deaf culture, the Deaf community and American Sign Language. I feel a desire to give back to the Deaf community who needs me.

I would love to pursue my educational goals and work with Deaf children in an educational setting of Speech Pathology.



Soroptimist International of Conejo Valley wins recognition from Camino Real Region.


